Steps and Traditions

STEP NINE:

Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

In the past we may have minimized our effect on others. It is difficult to take responsibility for our actions if we believe our actions have no impact. In changing our attitudes and actions, we no longer believe that what we do is insignificant. In Step Eight, we were truthful with ourselves about our past behavior and made our list. Having done this honestly, we found that we were released from some of our shame. This work prepares us to be more honest as we begin to make our amends. Amends are our pure truth without blame, distraction, justification, or manipulation; we are taking responsibility for our experience. We understand that making amends also means we are truly committed to changing with the help of our Higher Power.

Step Nine states that we make amends "wherever possible." However, we may owe amends to someone who has died, or whose whereabouts are not known, or where more harm may be caused

than good. Sometimes someone may refuse to hear an amends that we would like to make. As a substitute, we may write these amends in a journal and/or share them with a sponsor or someone unrelated to the circumstances.

A FEW QUESTIONS TO HELP YOU WORK STEP NINE:

1. What do I believe is the purpose of making amends?
2. How do I decide whether my amends would injure others or myself?
3. What is my motive for my amends?
4. What alternative actions can I take if direct amends aren't possible?

TRADITION NINE:

CoDA, as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

The Steps are our personal guides to spirituality while the Traditions guide our groups in the spiritual role of service work. Our Step work helps us with the application of the Tradition. One of the links between Step Nine and Tradition Nine is that both

ask us to be responsible. In Step Nine, we become responsible to ourselves for our actions and acknowledge our right to be, think and feel, and acknowledge others' right to do the same. In Tradition Nine, we accept our responsibility to trust the authority of the group conscience or those we are serving. We let go of our personal agendas and are reminded that the power in CoDA lies in our collective Higher Power and the group conscience of the Fellowship.

A FEW QUESTIONS TO HELP YOU WORK TRADITION NINE:

1. What is the difference between an organization and a Fellowship?
2. Why does CoDA have committees and service boards?
3. How does this Tradition support my recovery?

What is Codependence?

Many of us struggle with the questions: What is codependence? Am I codependent? We want precise definitions and diagnostic criteria before we decide. Codependents Anonymous, as stated in the Eighth Tradition, is a non-professional Fellowship. We offer no definitions or diagnostic criteria for codependence. What we do offer from our experience are characteristic attitudes and behaviors that describe what our codependent histories have been like. We believe that recovery begins with an honest self-diagnosis. We come to accept our inability to maintain healthy and nurturing relationships with ourselves and others. We begin to recognize that the cause lies in long-standing destructive patterns of living.

These patterns and characteristics are offered as a tool to aid in self-evaluation. They may be particularly helpful to newcomers.

Denial Patterns

Codependents:

- have difficulty identifying feelings,
- Minimize, alter or deny their feelings,
- Perceive themselves as being completely unselfish,
- Dedicated to the well-being of others.

Low Self-Esteem Patterns

Codependents:

- have difficulty making decisions,
- judge their thought, words and actions harshly, as never being good enough,
- are embarrassed to receive recognition, praise or gifts,
- are unable to ask others to meet their needs or wants,
- value other people's approval of their thoughts, feelings and behaviors over Self- approval.

Compliance Patterns

Codependents:

- compromise their values and integrity to avoid rejection and other people's Anger,
- are very sensitive to others' feelings and assume the same feelings,
- are extremely loyal, remaining in harmful situations too long,
- place a higher value on others' opinions and feelings, and are too afraid to express differing viewpoints or feelings,
- accept sex as a substitute for love

Control Patterns

Codependents:

- believe most others are incapable of taking care of themselves
- attempt to convince others what they should think and feel,
- become resentful when others refuse their offers of help
- freely offer advice and guidance without being asked
- lavish gifts and favors on those they care about,
- use sex to gain approval and acceptance,
- have to be needed in order to have a relationship with others

NO CROSSTALK

Crosstalk is any verbal or physical response to another person’s sharing. Interrupting, questioning, and offering advice, are universally considered to be crosstalk in CoDA. Physical touching by patting, rubbing, or hugging during the sharing session is considered crosstalk by some groups. Being touched interrupts a person’s sharing and redirects his/her attention to the other person’s actions.

USING “I”

STATEMENTS

Most CoDA groups encourage the use of “I” statements as a way of focusing the speaker’s attention on their individual experience. The use of “you” and “we” is discouraged, as these relate more to other people’s experiences. There is also a tendency for codependents to avoid dealing with their own issues by globalizing their experiences, presenting them as belonging to a large and nebulous “co-dependent we.” “You” and “we” statements may easily get into crosstalk.
